

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT
To the Board of Governors of Hope Uplift Foundation

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the annexed financial statements of "**Hope Uplift Foundation**", which comprise the statement of financial position as at **June 30, 2023** and the statement of income and expenditure, the statement of changes in fund, the statement of cash flow for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as the "**financial statements**").

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements together with the notes thereon present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of "**Hope Uplift Foundation**" (hereinafter referred to as the "**Foundation**") as at **June 30, 2023** and of the **surplus** and statement of changes in fund and its statement of cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with approved accounting standards comprise of "**Accounting standard for non-profit organizations (NPOs)**" issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as applicable in Pakistan. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the foundation in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and those with Governance for the Financial Statements

The **Board of Governance** are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting standard for **not-for-profit organizations (NPOs)** issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan, and for such internal control as the **Board of Governors** determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the **Board of Governors** Management are responsible for assessing the foundation ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the foundation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charge with governance are responsible for overseeing the **Foundation's** financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

1 CORPORATE AND GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1 Legal status and operations

Hope Uplift Foundation ("the Foundation") was registered in Pakistan as a non-profit organization on August 30, 2010 under the Societies Registration Act, 1860. The main objectives of the Foundation are to provide subsidized education, food and assistance to poor and under privileged communities to meet basic micro finance necessities of life.

2 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan. Approved Accounting Standards comprise of "Accounting standard for not-for-profit organizations (NPOs)" issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan.

3 BASIS OF PREPARATION

3.1 Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared under historical cost convention, on accrual basis except for statement of cash flow.

3.2 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Pakistan Rupees, which is also the Company's functional currency. All financial information presented in Pakistani Rupees has been rounded to the nearest Rupee.

4 KEY JUDGMENTS AND ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements, in conformity with the approved accounting standards, requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires the management to examine its judgment in the process of applying the foundation's accounting policies. Estimates and judgments are continuously evaluated and are based on historical experiences, including exceptions of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. The areas where various assumptions and estimates are significant to the foundation's financial statements and where judgment was exercised in the application of relevant accounting policies are as follows:

and



- a) Useful lives, residual values and depreciation method of property, plant and equipment;
- b) Useful life, residual value and amortization method of intangible asset;
- c) Impairment loss of non-financial assets;
- d) Estimation of contingent liabilities; and
- e) Current income tax expense and provision for income tax.

5 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented, unless otherwise stated.

5.1 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss except freehold land.

Depreciation is charged to income statement by applying reducing balance method to write-off the cost over estimated remaining useful life of asset. The residual values and useful lives of assets are reviewed at each financial year-end and adjusted, if impact on depreciation is significant.

Depreciation on additions to property, plant and equipment is charged from the month in which an asset is acquired or capitalized while no depreciation is charged for the month in which the asset is disposed-off.

Normal repairs and replacements are charged to statement of financial activities. Major improvements and modifications are capitalized and assets replaced, if any, other than those kept as stand-by, are retired.

Gain/(loss) on disposal of property, plant and equipment is included in determination of income for the year.

5.2 Intangible assets

Expenditure incurred to acquire computer software is capitalized as intangible asset and stated at cost less accumulated amortization and any identified impairment loss. Computer software is amortized using the straight line method.

Amortization on additions to computer software is charged from the month in which the asset is available for use while no amortization is charged for the month in which the asset is disposed off.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

5.3 Impairment

The carrying amount of the assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date to identify the circumstances indicating the occurrence of impairment loss or reversal of previous impairment losses. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of such asset is estimated and impairment loss is recognized in the income statement. Where an impairment loss is subsequently reversed, the carrying amount of such asset is increased to the revised recoverable amount, provided it does not exceed the depreciated historical cost of the asset. A reversal of impairment loss is recognized as income in income statement.



5.4 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash-in-hand, cash at bank in current, saving and deposit accounts and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amount of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

5.5 Provisions

Provisions are recognized in the financial statements when the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the obligation can be made of the amount of obligation. Provisions are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

5.6 Funds

a) Endowment fund

Endowment fund include funds received from the Board of Governors of the Foundation. The main objective of the fund is to provide for capital expenditures, as and when needed.

b) Restricted funds

Restricted funds, also called "Unspent Grant", represent a part of restricted net assets in the Foundation. These funds are received from general public and donors with a specific condition or purpose attached to their use. Such funds are initially recognized as deferred income and subsequently upon fulfilment of the specific condition or purpose, these are charged to statement of financial activities, in accordance with the approved accounting standards.

c) Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are received from donors with no specific condition or purpose attached for its use. Such funds are directly charged to statement of financial activities.

5.7 Income recognition

Income is recognized when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the entity and the income can be measured reliably. Income from school is recognized at the time when it is received. Donations and contributions are recognized when received. Deferred income is recognized on provision of related addition in cwip against which that income was received.

5.8 Financial assets

All financial assets are recognized at the time when the Foundation becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.



Financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss are initially recognized at fair value and transaction costs are expensed in the income and expenditure account. Financial assets are derecognized when the rights to receive cash flows from the assets have expired or have been transferred and the Foundation has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership. Available-for-sale financial assets and financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are subsequently carried at fair value. Loans and receivables and held-to-maturity investments are carried at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method.

5.9 Financial liabilities

All financial liabilities are recognized at the time when the Foundation becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial liabilities are initially recognized at cost, which is fair value of consideration received at the time when Company becomes party to contractual provisions of the instrument. After initial recognition, financial liabilities are carried at fair value, amortized cost or original cost as the case may be.

5.10 Cash and bank balances

Cash-in-hand and at bank are carried at cost.

5.11 Offsetting of financial assets and financial liabilities

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the financial statements only when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amount and the Foundation intends either to settle on a net basis or to realize the assets and to settle the liabilities simultaneously.

5.12 Trade and other payables

Liabilities for trade and other amounts payable are carried at cost, which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received, whether or not billed to the Company.

5.13 Trade and other receivables

Trade debts and other receivables are recognized initially at invoice value, which approximates fair value less an estimate for doubtful debtors based on review of outstanding amounts at the year-end. When a trade debt is uncollectible, it is written-off against the provision. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written-off are credited to the income and expenditure account.

5.14 Taxation

The provision for taxation has not been recognized in these financial statements since the income received by the Trust is subject to 100% tax credit under section 100C of the 'Income Tax Ordinance, 2001'.

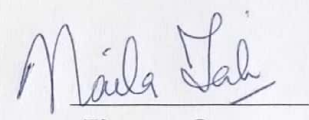
